No matter where life takes me, WBTT makes my heart beat like no other. We do Divine works of art here. I'm standing here because my mom taught me how to have a connection with the Divine. I pray your hearts open

to Divine Love like never before. To my mother Rosa, Brother Michael, Pops, and Amani, May the Divine's love always keep you covered and show you the way.



JOSHUA THOMPSON (Ensemble/Judas

Understudy) is a recent graduate of the American Musical and Dramatic Academy in New York City. He made his debut with

WBTT in Harry & Lena and was last seen in A Motown Christmas and Othello in the Park (New York). Other memorable performances include Rockin' Down Fairytale Lane, How I Got Over, The Wiz and American Roots: The Gospel Experience. He is working on honing his skills as a "triple threat" — dancer, actor and singer.

VINNETTE CARROLL (Concept and Book) (1922-2002) is celebrated as an artistic trailblazer in American theatre. She was the first African-American woman to direct on Broadway (Don't Bother Me. I Can't Cope, 1972) and was Founding Director of the Urban Arts Corps, an organization dedicated to launching and nurturing the careers of Black and Hispanic actors and other minority theatre artists, including Cicely Tyson and Sherman Hemsley. She was also the Director of the New York State Ghetto Arts Project, bringing theatre and dance to underserved communities, and presented theatre classics and modern plays at the Inner City Repertory in the Watts district of Los Angeles. As an actor, Carroll won an Obie (off-Broadway) Award in 1962 for her role in *Moon Over a Rainbow* Shawl, which also starred James Earl Jones. In 1964 she won TV's Emmy Award for her work in Beyond the Blues. As a film actor she appeared in *Up the Down Staircase* (1967) and Alice's Restaurant (1969). In the 1970s she had her two biggest successes as a creator, producer and director. Don't Bother Me, I Can't Cope, a Gospel revue with songs by Micki Grant, was originally staged by the Urban Arts Corps. It then moved to Broadway, establishing Carroll as the first Black female Broadway director. The show ran for more than 1.000 performances. In 1976. Your Arms Too Short

to Box with God debuted on Broadway, with revivals in 1980 (featuring Jennifer Holliday) and 1982 (starring Al Green and Patti Labelle). In the late 1980s Carroll founded the Vinnette Carroll Repertory Theatre in Fort Lauderdale, Fla. She died in 2002, but her groundbreaking work lives on in her creations and her influence on countless other theatre artists, particularly African-American playwrights, producers and directors.

**ALEX BRADFORD** (Music & Lyrics) (1927-1978) was known professionally as "Professor Alex Bradford." A composer. arranger, choir director and singer. he influenced the movement toward large Gospel choirs in performing and recording. He sang Gospel music as a child growing up in Bessemer, Alabama. studied in New York, and moved to Chicago in 1947. He toured with Mahalia Jackson and other Gospel artists and had a hit record with "Too Close to Heaven" in 1954. His singing style influenced early Rock & Roll and Rhythm & Blues artists such as Ray Charles and Little Richard. In the early 1960s he appeared in an off-Broadway and touring production of the Langston Hughes musical Black Nativity. for which he also contributed music. He won an Obie Award in 1972 for his acting in Vinnette Carroll's Don't Bother Me, I Can't Cope, with music by Micki Grant. A few years later, he worked with Carroll and with co-composer Micki Grant on the music and lyrics for Your Arms Too Short to Box with God.

MICKI GRANT (Music & Lyrics) is a composer, singer, actor and writer. In the early 1960s she appeared in an off-Broadway production of Jean Genet's The Blacks with James Earl Jones and Cicely Tyson. In 1964 she was cast in Mark Blitztein's song-play The Cradle Will Rock and in the musical Brecht on Brecht. She landed some of the first recurring roles for African-American actors in the daytime soap operas Another World and The Edge of Night. In the 1970s she began a successful collaboration with Vinnette Carroll when she wrote the songs for Don't Bother Me, I Can't Cope, and later, with Alex Bradford, the music and lyrics for Carroll's Your Arms Too Short to Box with God.



#### HARRY BRYCE

(Director) has developed visionary works as a director, choreographer, writer, and arts educator for more than 33 years. Harry has led dance companies in

Richmond, Va., and Atlanta, Ga., where his original concert ballet. Bevond the Canebreaks: Moments in the Life of Harriet Tubman, performed to soldout crowds and received national and critical acclaim at the National Black Arts Festival. In 1997 Harry founded the Memphis Black Repertory Theatre and served as producing artistic director for five seasons, during which he garnered 17 theatre awards. Harry has directed for professional theatre companies throughout the U.S. and was the recipient of the 2000 Carter G. Woodson Award of Merit for Lifetime Achievements in Performing Arts. Currently, Harry serves as an Artistic Associate for the Cumberland County Playhouse (the largest and oldest professional regional theatre in Tennessee), where he has directed numerous productions over the past 14 vears. At Westcoast Black Theatre Troupe. Harry's directing credits include Dearly Departed, Bubbling Brown Sugar, Little Shop of Horrors and It Ain't Nothin' But the Blues. He is thrilled to be back with WBTT to direct his 10th show.



NATE JACOBS (WBTT Founder & Artistic Director) is a driving force in Florida's theatre scene. A graduate of Florida A&M University, Nate founded Westcoast Black Theatre Troupe in

1999. He has written, composed, directed and performed in many shows, as an actor, singer, dancer and comedian. He works extensively in the community training and mentoring youth in the performing arts. As a result of his outstanding contributions to young people, the Sarasota County Branch NAACP Youth Council recognized Nate as one of its 2012 Men of Valor. In the spring of 2013, he was inducted into the Community Video Archives Hall of Fame for his significant contributions to

the arts and education. In 2015, Nate was recognized as a Champion of Diversity for the arts during the Biz(941) and La Guia magazines' Unity Awards Luncheon, and was honored with the prestigious Larry Leon Hamlin Producer Award during the National Black Theatre Festival in Winston-Salem, N.C., "for his contributions to Black theatre specifically and American theatre in general." In 2017, Goodwill Manasota named him a Community Ambassador of the Year. In 2018, the Arts and Cultural Alliance of Sarasota County honored Nate with the Arts Leadership Award for Artistic Achievement. In 2019 he brought Soul Man to the National Black Theatre Festival in Winston-Salem, N.C. -WBTT's fourth appearance there.
